Skills Student Success – "I like to work hard"

Twenty-one year old Batou Sanneh thought she was going to have to give up on her education at Sunrise, until she was offered sponsorship for the last two years of skills classes. She enjoyed learning English and maths and originally wanted to work in a hotel, but found her love of cooking in her work experience placement; at the Four Seasons restaurant. Now that she has graduated, she has been offered a permanent job there as a cook; "I like to work hard and I respect my job. I like cooking too - I must rush and do it fastly," explains Batou. When asked what she most likes cooking, Batou said: "Pizza, and fish and chips!"

Batou is joined at Four Seasons by two other Sunrise students who also did their work placement there – Cecilia Gomez and Versine Jatta are both waitresses.

Batou worked very hard at Sunrise, and graduated with three prizes – an award for maths, an award for tie and dye, and the 'best student overall'. Batou also enjoyed tie and dye lessons, and added; "Many people say that my tie and dye practical was so nice, so I also want to make some tie and dye materials for business." Student Hardship

FundWe have been VERY successful in collecting donations for our new hardship fund - a new support fund for the pupils and students whose families fall upon hard times.

As trustees, we have been debating how to choose which of the many deserving cases can have access to these funds and for how long. This allows us to be as fair and consistent as possible and yet to give the best possible help to keep someone's education going. We already have several good candidates for these funds based on our criteria: —

- Sudden death of a parent/guardian (allowing time for wider family or sponsor to help fund)
- Loss of GETS Sponsor for a student (allowing time to find a new sponsor to fund)
- Sunrise students in their final year may be supported if their parents cannot pay the fees, provided the


pupil/student has good reports.

One thing that the fund will be unable to do is to support students at the expensive private schools that many of our external

One thing that the fund will be unable to do is to support students at the expensive private schools that many of our external sponsored student's parents choose for their children - so a move to a state school or Sunrise may also be a requirement of financial help. The maximum support is likely to be 1 year.

Although we don't need more cash at this stage for Hardship, if you'd like to help us further then we <u>really need</u> cash to pay the Teacher's salaries – See *our new initiative* (Sponsor a class).





What's it like working in the Nursery School?

We have known Mbacho Jallow at Sunrise for many years now. Firstly as a Graduating Skills Training Student and then as a Classroom Assistant in the Sunrise Nursery School. This is her story:-



"Since my coming in Sunrise as a teacher assistant I have achieved a great development in term of teaching and personal development.

In the first place I have achieved internal training through the help of the ECD teachers in the areas of phonic, working with group and stepping in when a teacher is absent, classroom management and most importantly self-confident.

I have now find it easy to work with group. Am very lucky to be part of the training of these children both in manners and mental development. Today about 90% of them can recognise the letter sounds, numbers, blend letters, forming words, adding, shapes, colours and they can write well and read.

So for me this is so good and a great achievement for me. I would not have achieve this without the Charity and sunrise most importantly."

A UK Student's view of life in The Gambia - Lucy Hobson, 18

"Donating a sum of money is one thing, but physically seeing how such a small gift can have such a huge impact on an individual's life is something on another scale.

Before visiting the Gambia on a school trip, I was given the opportunity to sponsor a student at the 'Sunrise Centre'. I took up this opportunity and donated £10 a month to enable now-graduated, Kaddy Sanyang to attend school. In Gambia we met Kaddy and were invited to her home. Seeing basically western-necessities such as the toilet (hole in the ground) and shower (bucket), it became clear that without an education and thus a job, standards of living become very low.

The small donation of £10 a month goes barely unnoticed from the pocket of the average British individual – a main course at a restaurant, a new item of clothing... or a child's education for an entire month. Think about it."

Life skill is another important lesson that helps me a lot as I used to be a very short tempered girl but now life skill has changed my life. Maths is a subject that I used to struggle with but now am very comfortable because all is going well. I am really having a nice time in the school and would like to continue till I graduate.

Also what I enjoy most was the ebbeh day that was staged in the school, it was a big fun and I enjoy it very much. My other impression of the school was the sport day for the nursery kids. It was one the biggest fun I have ever attended. It was a great day for me.

The environment is also very friendly and all students speak English

which has made great impact on me too. I would like to be a waitress when I finish my studies, because I like meeting new friends."

Exciting news - Your money can help more children than ever!

Angela also helps with fundraising and the Cadets have a stand at the 138th Annual Driffield Show, where they hope to raise the remaining funds required. We are delighted to have this kind of help from our supporters and look forward to completing the work in time for the visit of 30 of the Air Cadets to Sunrise during April 2014, as part of their Duke of Edinburgh's Gold Award.
