Sunrise Nursery visit 'My Farm' (by Fatou Sally Ceesay and Mbacho Jallow)

We the Sunrise Nursery School has visited My Farm on 21st March at 10:00am, staying until 3:00pm which was one of the most Educative day for both teachers and the students. When we reached My Farm, everyone was happy to be there and the staff were also very happy to receive children from Sunrise Centre.

We were taken to the farm bantaba where they sang a welcoming song for the children. There was a man by the name Alhagie who explained so many things to us about MyFarm. There he also explained that the farm is open to everyone especially the young ones who are living within the community who visits the farm everyday. Some of these young ones are going to school while others are not.

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We then divided children into three different groups then began to do and see different things in the Farm. We were taken to a pool where there were fishes, we also saw rabbits, pigs, duck and ducklings and also lots of tress in the Farm. There were also lots of fruits and vegetables, we then went to the computer room with some children, where they find it more enjoyable and interesting. Children were later given some block puzzles to fix as a big house and some were given number puzzles and some were given shapes to fix as well

Lunch was served in individual plates of 'benechine' with a local drink called wonjo. MyFarm staff confessed to us that our children were the best-behaved school they ever had. Students were listening, well controlled and above all very discipline. We all enjoyed it a lot.

Fatou Sally Ceesay is our nursery 1 teacher, and Mbacho Jallow is the classroom assistant.

We were also able to build a **new sports area**, following a kind donation from Driffield 873 Squadron Air Cadets, mentioned recently, following support from Angela Longoni-Sarr who acts as their Civilian Chairperson. Angela and their leader CO Adrian Hanrahan have both visited Sunrise but sadly the Cadets themselves have had to delay their trip until 2015.

The sports area was only constructed in February 2014 using donations raised and given to GETS by the Air Cadets, as part of their "Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award".

The sports area has posts and courts marked out for football, netball and volley ball, though we already use it for many other games too.


New classrooms almost complete..!

Since the turn of the year Dawn and Paul Webster have been collecting school furniture again to send out in a container. Before this happens all the furniture is checked for completeness and cleaned, often of horrible chewing gum.

This furniture has been given to GETS free of charge but of course we have had to pay for transportation and packing, since this must be done by professionals.

GETS have arranged and sent a container from Newport to Banjul packed full of all that we need to complete our Lower Basic classroom, just in time to start up a new Lower Basic 3 class in September 2014. We also need to recruit a teacher of course (and a classroom assistant too!)

Our furniture was sourced for free, but our transport and packing costs were £3,000, which we will need to fundraise.

Sunrise Garden – blooming marvellous!



At the Sunrise Centre we are trying again to get the garden going to teach the students the benefits of different methods of growing plants. They have all been to a local centre called MyFarm, whose staff have demonstrated many ways to get the best out of a garden.

The first fruits of the garden, now fully walled off to protect the planting from wildlife, are now available. The staff have been cutting Sorrel leaves as a salad vegetable and have been selling lettuce. All this aids school funds, of course. Helen is pictured with a huge crop of lettuce, which grows very quickly here.

Mr Ali Bah (English and Maths Teacher) has taken the garden under his wing. He is often in it first thing before school begins tending it.
