The Njie family, who live near the Kotu watertank, already know it's true - their two children are sponsored through GETS - the younger one. Pa Mustapha, at Sunrise.

Although the family's budget is very limited, they took responsibility for a young relative (Jo-Jo Seh) from the North bank area of The Gambia. There she had no chance to attend school and spoke no English. When the family's sponsors discovered this in January, they managed to arrange for Jo-Jo to attend a local nursery school, supported by intensive coaching from Mrs Sanneh, one of Sunrise's outstanding teachers.

This was possible because Dawn (one of the Trustees) was working at Sunrise and could act as a "go-between". At her recent entry test Jo-Jo showed that she has already learnt a great deal and, with luck, will be able to start at Sunrise in September.

It is a sobering footnote that sponsoring this family to educate their children, deal with a very serious health problem and set up a small business, has cost the sponsors the equivalent of 2 pints of beer per week over the last 4 years!

Improving Standards in Sunrise



We always look at how are the children and young people are doing in the Sunrise school.

In our Lower Basic classes their performance is also examined across all of Gambia too, in National Assessment Tests (NAT). With this in mind we are required to show performance of the LB on graphs, like the one shown here. Target pass rate is 80%.

Mr Cham has been looking at this performance and made a number of comments:-

• During Term 2 we lost some time due to the presidential elections this year and some children left the country for a time. The school was closed during part of January.

• The standard of the questions was made more difficult in Term 2 and were based on the NAT standard.

• The coverage of the syllabus in Term 1 was not that much, as it is just 61 days and all the questions were derived purely from Term 1 but Term 2 exams covers both Terms. Students may have already forgotten some notes of Term 1.

Fundraising – A big challenge for Karl Jackson

Kare, the wife of one of our supporters, Karl Jackson, sadly passed away unexpectedly at a very young age but out of this tragedy has come a series of fundraising initiatives from family and friends, all to help GETS do more in The Gambia.

Last year Karl's good friend, Rob Wakefield took on the Snowdonia Trail Marathon, completing it in just 6 hours and 13 minutes, raising over £18,000.

This year Karl himself sets out to walk the 177 mile trek along Offa's dyke., in 15 walking days.

Offa's Dyke is a great frontier earthwork built by Offa, King of Mercia from 757 to 796 A.D. It gives its name to a long distance footpath, one of Britain's National Trails, which runs from Sedbury, near Chepstow, to Prestatyn

The procedure that we follow then checks that there is genuine hardship, with a member of the community visiting the home (compound) to effectively do a means test. We then try and find sponsors -

Water Pressure – a success story by Barry Young

For almost a year now, our mains water supply at the Sunrise school has been very poor. Due to very low pressure, the water storage tank we had installed above the toilets on the Lower Basic School first floor had not been filling, at times leaving the school with little or no water in the mornings and a very weak supply at other times. The situation was becoming intolerable as even basic health and hygiene was difficult to maintain. We raised this problem with NAWEC (The National Water and Electricity Company) last October and they sent one of their managers and a team of engineers to investigate. They promised to reconnect us to an alternative mains supply as soon as parts were available in the country.

Unfortunately, when I arrived at the school in February, nothing had happened and the supply was worse than ever. It had even been necessary to resort to collecting water in buckets from a compound across the road on some occasions!

We therefore drafted a letter addressed to the Director responsible at NAWEC and this was delivered by hand and followed up with a visit a few weeks later. Another visit by engineers and a debate about another possible solution ended up with the original plan being implemented and the school now has running water again. Thank you NAWEC!

Our persistence paid off resulting in a successful outcome to one of the many problems faced by the trustees and staff in running a school in The Gambia!



Note that during the period with water problems we have also implemented a number of water saving measures, including fitting push taps to try and avoid students leaving taps on, making water pressure even worse. GETS are very grateful to the Johnson Family who sponsored these improvements with money collected in memory of the late Alan Johnson.
